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1 Study Program Handbook – German Language

Learning German at Constructor University

German language courses at Constructor University help you develop practical language skills while earning ECTS credits as part of your degree. For all undergraduate students, German classes are mandatory electives, and a maximum of two courses will be rewarded with 2.5 ECTS each. Students may continue beyond two classes to further enhance their German language skills at the German Language Program and additional courses will show on their Transcript of Records.

Course Offerings

All German courses follow the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages (CEFR), ensuring internationally recognized learning standards across all proficiency levels. As an official telc test center, our German Language Program also offers internationally recognized telc language exams.

The program supports students from beginner to advanced levels and provides a structured pathway for continuous language development. Courses are offered both online and on campus.

The courses are structured in ascending order of difficulty; that is, students can only take courses in sequential order and cannot be placed in a lower-level course once they have passed a given course level.

Placement

A placement test helps place students in the appropriate German language course based on their current language proficiency. The placement test is not graded and does not affect their final course grade. It is used solely for course placement.

Complete beginners do not need to take a placement test and can register directly on CampusNet for one of the A1.1 courses course offered. The same applies to students who have already taken a course. They can register directly for the next higher-level course on CampusNet. German native speakers or students with C1 proficiency level cannot enroll into German and must instead pick the Humanities lectures.

Students with prior knowledge must take a placement test. If they have a language proficiency certificate that is no more than one year old, they may hand it in as a stand-in for the placement test. The results of the placement test are valid for one academic year; after that, the test must be retaken if no course has been completed in the meantime. Registering for a beginner course despite existing language skills constitutes a violation of the Code of Academic Integrity.

The placement test must be taken during the registration period for the current semester and will be accepted no later than two days before the end of the registration period.

Registration

During the registration period at Constructor University, you can register for a German course on CampusNet. All German courses (online and on-campus) are listed in the course catalog on CampusNet at the same time as other courses.

- It is not possible to register before or after the registration period.
- There is no drop-add period.
- The number of participants per course and the total number of German courses are limited.
- Spots are assigned on a first-come, first-served basis.
- Audits are not permitted in German courses.

If you find that the course level isn't right for you, please contact your instructor.

Withdrawals from a course may be communicated directly to Registrar Services. Please be aware that both course changes and withdrawals are only permitted within the first two weeks of the semester.

Language Module Completion

A German module is considered complete once all module requirements have been successfully met. These are:

- Regular attendance
- Regular submission of homework assignments
- Passing the final exam with a total of $\geq 45\%$

Regular class attendance and the assigned work in the virtual classroom is a pre-requisite for the module achievement (admittance to the final exam): Students are allowed to have a maximum of three unexcused absences, the assigned activities in the virtual classroom count as attendance. Students who missed more than ten sessions (whereby at least seven sessions are official excuses) are requested to consult the German Language Program before a decision regarding the admission to the module assessment or its grading can be made.
